VISITING MONTGOMERY

The historic town of Montgomery lies in the Welsh Marches, ideally placed for visitors from all directions. Marcus Berkmann is the author of, among other books, Berkmann's Pop Miscellany, Berkmann's Cricketing

Miscellany and Still a Bit of Snap in the Celery. He is a regular contributor to Private Eye, Saga Magazine and the Daily Mail, where he reviews books. He has written columns for the Independent magazine and The Spectator, TV reviews for the Daily Mail and sports columns for Punch, the Independent on Sunday and the Daily Express. He also writes and produces fiendish quizzes, and is a regular on BBC Radio 4's Round Britain Quiz.

JONATHAN COE



Jonathan Coe was born in Birmingham in 1961. He is the award-winning, bestselling author of novels that include

What a Carve Up!; The Rotters' Club; Middle England; Bournville and 2024's The Proof of My Innocence. He has won the Costa Novel Award, the Prix du Livre Européen, the John Llewellyn Rhys Prize, the Prix Médicis Étranger and the Bollinger Everyman Wodehouse Prize, among many others. He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature and an Officier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres. His work has been translated into 22 languages. Suspended Moment, an album of his musical compositions recorded live in Italy, was released on the British Progressive Jazz label in 2023.

CARYS DAVIES



Carys Davies is the author of Clear (2024), The Mission House (2020) and West (2018), which won the Wales Book of

the Year Fiction award, was Runner-Up for the Society of Author's McKitterick Prize and shortlisted for the Rathbones Folio Prize. Her short stories have been widely published in magazines and anthologies and broadcast on BBC Radio 4, and have won the Jerwood Fiction Uncovered Prize, the Society of Authors' Olive Cook Award, the Royal Society of Literature's V S Pritchett Prize, and a Northern Writers' Award. Davies second collection, *The Redemption of Galen Pike*, won the Frank O'Connor International Short Story Award 2015.

ANNIE GARTHWAITE



Annie Garthwaite grew up in a working-class community in the northeast of England and studied at the University of

Wales before embarking on an international business career. In 2017 she studied for an MA in Creative Writing at Warwick University where she wrote her debut novel, Cecily, published by Penguin in 2021. It was named a 'top pick' by The Times and Sunday Times, a 'Best Book of 2021' by independent bookshops and Waterstones, and has recently been optioned for TV. Annie's second novel, The King's Mother, was published in 2024 and immediately named 'Book of the Month' by The Times.

JON GOWER



Jon Gower has over forty books to his name, in Welsh and English, including *Birdland*: A Journey Around Britain on the

Wing; Raider. The Raymond Chester Story The Turning Tide: A Biography of the Irish Sea, and Y Diwedd, the final volume of his Welsh language crime trilogy. He is also the author of *The Story of Wales* which accompanied the landmark BBC series, *An Island Called Smith* which gained the John Morgan Travel Writing Award, and *Y Storïwr* which won the Wales Book of the Year award. He is a former BBC Wales arts and media correspondent and was for many years the presenter of Radio Wales' arts' programme *First Hand*.

ANDREW GREEN



Since retiring as Librarian of the National Library of Wales in 2013, Andrew Green has spent time walking and

in his latest book, Voices on the Path: a history of walking in Wales. His previous books include Wales in 100 Objects and Cymru mewn 100 Gwrthrych (2018) and a satirical novel Rhwng y Silffoedd (2020). Since 2013 he has also published a weekly blog under the name 'gwallter'. He is currently working on a new book on Cader Idris as it has been imagined by artists since the eighteenth century.

BETHANY HANDLEY



Bethany Handley is an award-winning writer, poet and disability activist from Monmouthshire. Named one o

the UK's ten most influential disabled people in politics, law, and media 2024 by the Shaw Trust, she campaigns for disability rights and better access to nature. An ambassador for Country Living's Access for All, Wales Coast Path, and Ramblers Cymru, her debut poetry pamphlet Cling Film was published by Seren in 2025. She coedited Beyond/Tu Hwnt, an anthology of Welsh Deaf and disabled writers. Her work has been featured by the Poetry Foundation, Poetry Wales, BBC Radio 4, Country Living and more.

ALIS HAWKINS



Alis Hawkins grew up in
Ceredigion and currently lives
on the Welsh-English border.
Her Teifi Valley Coroner

historical crime series is set in the area where she grew up and has twice been shortlisted for the prestigious CWA Historical Dagger. A Bitter Remedy, the first in her Oxford Mysteries series, which introduces readers to young Welsh polymath Rhiannon Vaughan and college lecturer Basil Rice, was shortlisted for the 2024 Historical Dagger. The sequel, The Skeleton Army was published in 2024. Alis is a founder of Welsh crime writers' collective Crime Cymru, a writing tutor for Literature Wales and mentor to emerging crime writers.

HANAN ISSA



Hanan Issa is a Welsh-Iraqi poet, filmmaker, and artist. Her publications include her poetry collection *My Body Can*

House Two Hearts, Welsh Plural: Essays on the Future of Wales and her children's poetry anthology And I Hear Dragons. Her winning monologue With Her Back Straight was performed as part of the Hijabi Monologues. She is part of the writers' room for Channel 4's award-winning series We Are Lady Parts. Her short film The Golden Apple – a Ffilm Cymru/ BBC Wales commission - is available on iPlayer. She was the 2023 Hay International Fellow and is the current National Poet of Wales.

ANGELA V. JOHN



Angela V. John has written over a dozen books including Behind the Scenes: The Dramatic Lives of Philip

Burton, Elizabeth Robins: Staging a Life 1862-1952 and The Actors' Crucible: Port Talbot and the Making of Burton, Hopkins, Sheen and All the Others.
Angela grew up in Port Talbot and first met Richard Burton in 1969. Formerly a History professor at the University of Greenwich, she is currently an honorary professor at Swansea University, president of Llafur, the Welsh People's History Society and of the Port Talbot Musical Theatre Society.

RHIAN E. JONES



Rhian E. Jones is a writer, critic and broadcaster from South Wales, who writes on history, politics and popular culture.

She is co-editor of Red Pepper and writes for Tribune magazine. Her books include Clampdown: Pop-Cultural Wars on Class and Gender (zer0, 2013); Petticoat Heroes: Gender, Culture and Popular Protest (University of Wales Press, 2015); Triptych: Three Studies of Manic Street Preachers' The Holy Bible (Repeater, 2017), the anthology of women's music writing Under My Thumb: Songs That Hate Women and the Women Who Love Them (Repeater, 2017) and Paint Your Town Red: How Preston Took Back Control and Your Town Can Too (Repeater, 2021).

JJ LAMBERT



JJ Lambert lives in Carmarthenshire between the Brecon Beacons and the Elenydd. Her first novel,

Found Wanting, was published by Black Bee Books in June 2024 and longlisted for the Mslexia Children's and Young Adult Prize. She co-facilitates the Sit Down and Write online writing group for marginalised Welsh writers and is currently researching the narration of Twm Sion Cati and the Elenydd.

CARYL LEWIS



Caryl Lewis is a multi-awardwinning Welsh novelist, children's writer, playwright and screenwriter. Her

breakthrough novel Martha, Jac a Sianco (2004) is widely regarded as a modern classic of Welsh literature and sits on the Welsh curriculum. The film adaptation – with a screenplay by Lewis herself – went on to win six Welsh BAFTAS and the Spirit of the Festival Award at the 2010 Celtic Media Festival. Lewis's other screenwriting work includes the BBC/S4C thrillers Hinterland and Hidden. She is a visiting lecturer in Creative Writing at Cardiff University and lives with her family on a farm near Aberystwyth. 2022's Drift was her debut novel in the English language, followed in 2025 by Bitter Honey.

GWYNETH LEWIS



All Gwyneth Lewis ever wanted to be was a writer. Brought up Welsh-speaking in Cardiff, she studied English

and spent time in America. She was Wales's first National Poet and composed the six-foot-high words on the front of the Wales Millennium Centre. Her other non-fiction books are Sunbathing in the Rain: A Cheerful Book on Depression and Two in a Boat: A Marital Voyage. She has published nine books of poetry, the latest being Sparrow Tree.

LLOYD LLEWELLYN-JONES



Lloyd Llewellyn-Jones is Professor of Ancient History at Cardiff University. He is a specialist in the histories and

cultures of Near Eastern and Hellenistic antiquity and champions a global approach to the study of the ancient world. Lloyd has appeared on the BBC, Channel 4, in The Times and other media and on many popular podcasts. He has worked closely with the British Museum on major exhibitions. His previous books include Persians: the Age of the Great Kings and Designs on the Past: How Hollywood Created the Ancient World. Born in Cefn Cribwr, Lloyd now lives in Taff's Well, Wales.

ROGER MORGAN-GRENVILLE



Roger Morgan-Grenville is writer and conservation campaigner specialising in the practicalities of biodiversity

loss and recovery. His books include Liquid Gold: Bees and the Pursuit of Midlife Honey, Shearwater, Taking Stock: A Journey Among Cows; Across a Waking Land; The Return of the Grey Partridge and 2025's The Restless Coast. Before becoming a full-time writer, he was a soldier and worked at a small kitchenware company. He also helped to found and fundraise for the charity Help for Heroes and is a founding member and former chair of trustees of the campaigning charity, Curlew Action.

DAFYDD MORGAN LEWIS

Rhys Mwyn is a musician, archaeologist, writer and broadcaster. As a music manager, agent, publicist,

Record Label and promoter, he has worked with acts as varied as Catatonia, The Rich Kids, Viv Albertine (The Slits), Y Cyrff and Datblygu. He previously played bass guitar in the Welsh Punk band, Anhrefn and established the record label Recordiau Anhrefn. Rhys is a regular contributor to Yr Herald Gymraeg and Llafar Gwlad, has published his autobiography Cam i'r Tywyllch (Y Lolfa) and written several Welsh language books on Welsh Archaeology (Carreg Gwalch). Montgomeryshire born, he now lives in Caernarfon.

MICHELE O'LEARY



Michele O'Leary is now retired and living in Pembrokeshire, but for 41 years she practised as a barrister and, for the last 21, sat

as a fee-paid judge at the Central Family Court in London. She became a Master of the Bench of Lincoln's Inn in 2007 and has been heavily involved in advocacy training in the UK and internationally. She continues to teach advocacy in Keble College and Lincoln's Inn and enjoys being close to the Irish Sea (preferably only in it in the summer). She has known Jonathan Coe since they both had real colour in their hair.

MIKE PARKER



Mike Parker is the bestselling author of *On the Red Hill* and *All the Wide Border* as well other books including *Map*

Addict and The Wild Rover. He was also the co-author of the first five editions of the Rough Guide to Wales. He has written and presented several series of travelogues for ITV Wales, has worked on numerous other TV and radio programmes, and occasionally performs as a stand-up comedian and actor. Born and bred in the Midlands, Mike now lives near Machynlleth, identifying as Cymro o ddewis – a Welshman by choice.

ANGHARAD PRICE

Sun, West of the Moon, published by Seren Books, was longlisted for the Laurel Prize. He was also shortlisted for the Royal Society of Literature's Jerwood Poetry Prize 2024. He is the founder of Wales's first YouTube poetry channel, Just Another Poet.

JON SAVAGE



Jon Savage is an awardwinning, bestselling author, broadcaster and journalist. His books include *The Secret*

Public: How LGBTQ Performers Shaped Popular Culture; This Searing Light, the Sun and Everything Else: Joy Division: The Oral History, England's Dreaming: Sex Pistols and Punk Rock; Teenage: The Creation of Youth, 1875-1945 and 1966: The Year The Decade Exploded. He has written sleevenotes for Wire, St. Etienne and the Pet Shop Boys, among others, and his compilations include: Meridian 1970 (Heavenly/EMI 2005); Queer Noises: From the Closest to the Charts 1961-1976 (Trikont 2006); and Dreams Come True: Classic Electro 1982-87 (Domino 2008).

OWEN STANTON



Owen Staton is a performance storyteller, writer, director and host of the *Time between Times* podcast. Owen has told

stories from Wales and beyond for most of his life and particularly loves Welsh Ghost lore. His Edinburgh fringe show Dark Heart of the Valley won an award which led to him touring the USA. Time between Times was recently nominated in the listeners choice category of the British podcast awards and Owen often appears on TV and radio talking about the strange. He is 52 years old and can do nothing with his hair.

ED TALFAN



Ed Talfan is the Creative
Director and CEO of Severn
Screen Ltd. His recent credits
include the film *Mr Burton*

(2025), starring Toby Jones and Harry Lawtey; *Havoc* (2024), starring Tom Hardy and Forest Whitaker and *The Pembrokeshire* Murders (2021) starring Luke Evans. He also Executive Produced and co-created the BBC drama series, Hidden/Craith, which ran for three seasons between 2018 and 2022; was Executive Producer on the four-part BBC drama Steeltown Murders (2023), and co-created and produced three series of the award-winning drama Hinterland (2013-2016). Ed is also a board member of Hijinx Theatre.

KANDACE SIOBHAN WALKER



Kandace Siobhan Walker is a writer and artist of Jamaican-Canadian, Saltwater Geechee and Welsh heritage. She is the

author of two books of poetry *Kaleido* (Bad Betty Press, 2022) and *Cowboy* (CHEERIO, 2023). Her installation *Dreamerism* (2024) appeared in Jerwood Arts' nationally-touring group exhibition *Survey III.* She lives in London.

SIONED WILIAM



Sioned Wiliam comes from Barry. She is the author of the novels, Dal i Fynd, Chwynnu, Cicio'r Bar and Y Gwyliau and

is currently working on her fitfh, 60-Rhywbeth. Sioned began her television and radio career at the BBC, before becoming an independent producer. Her credits include Tonight with Jonathan Ross, Game On, Big Train and Yonderland. She also produced iDot and exec produced Rhestr Nadolig Wil for Boom/S4C. She has been nominated for a Bafta award three times and has won a British Comedy Award and a Bronze Rose at Montreux. She was also a Commissioning Editor for ITV and BBC Radio 4 and spent last year as the interim CEO of S4C.

RUSS WILLIAMS



Russ Williams grew up in Caernarfon and now lives in Cardiff. He has worked as a journalist in Wales and

Australia and continues to write while working as a family mediator, helping to prevent youth homelessness. He is a member of Roath Writers, a Cardiff-based writing group, and the author of Free House, a collection of short stories set in a fictional Welsh pub. He also runs two blogs, *Brawd Autistico*, which documents his life with an autistic brother, and *Where the Folk*, about Welsh folklore and urban myths and the inspiration for his 2023 book, *Where the Folk*.

Matthew Yeomans is an author and writer. His book, Return to My Trees, was published by Calon in 2022,

followed in 2024 by Seascapes: Notes From a Changing Coastline. As a journalist he has written about the environment, sustainability, travel, business and technology for publications in both the UK and the US, including The New York Times, The Guardian, National Geographic and The Atlantic Monthly. He has also been a senior editor at The Industry Standard and The Village Voice. Matthew has also taught journalism and writing at New York University and Cardiff University School of Journalism, Media and Culture.






Cardiganshire rebelled against the imposition of tolls on the roads they travelled while making their living. They dressed themselves in dramatic and colourful costumes, and led by the enigmatic figure of 'Rebecca', they attacked symbols of injustice, redistributed wealth, and clashed with both local authorities and the national government.
